OFFICER DENNIS CLARK AWARDED MEDAL OF VALOR

During an awards ceremony held on November 12, 2011,

Officer Dennis Clark was awarded the Medal of Valor by the Jerome Police Department. The award was presented by Mayor John Shine at the Jerome Police Department's first awards banquet. The Medal of Valor is the Jerome Police Department's highest honor and is awarded for an act of outstanding bravery or heroism by which the individual has demonstrated a great degree of selflessness, personal courage and devotion to duty beyond the normal demands of police service. To be awarded the Medal of Valor an officer must have performed an act displaying extreme courage while consciously facing the risk of great bodily harm or death.

Officer Clark was awarded the Medal of Valor for his actions on February 7, 2011. On that date, Officer Clark attempted to stop a suspect for a violation which resulted in a high speed pursuit. At one point during the pursuit, the suspect stopped and fired a shotgun blast at Officer Clark which resulted in Clark being struck in the left eye by a shotgun pellet. Knowing that the suspect posed a deadly threat to fellow officers and innocent bystanders, Officer Clark continued the pursuit despite the fact he was bleeding and becoming light headed. Not knowing how long he could continue the pursuit and fearing for the safety of others if the suspect remained at large, Officer Clark made the decision to ram the suspect vehicle and bring the pursuit to an end. This action allowed back

up officers who were close at hand to be able to take the suspect into custody without further injury to officers or innocent bystanders. Following the event, Officer Clark went through a long and painful physical recovery and lost sight in his left eye. During this incident, Officer Clark demonstrated outstanding personal courage and heroism in the face of great danger. In addition to the Medal of Valor, Officer Clark was also awarded the Purple Heart and the Combat Action Medal.

THE IMPORTANCE OF BACKFLOW PREVENTION

Summer has ended and with it the watering season. The irrigation water is no longer flowing in the Northside Canal, sprinklers systems have been prepared for winter, and our water quality concerns are over with. . . right? Wrong. The Water Operators for the City of Jerome are constantly concerned about the potential contamination from a backflow incident.

Backflow incidents occur daily in the United States and although these incidents typically only affect a single household, there are millions of opportunities to create cross connection contaminations, which can result in significant backflow incidents. The possibility of an incident increases when there are piping mistakes, unlicensed contractors, incorrect plumbing, unregulated manufacturers, and careless connections to irrigation systems and retention ponds. While certain cross-connections will not result in illnesses from consuming contaminated drinking water, other cross connections are likely to cause people to get sick.

As classified by the American Backflow Prevention Association on cross-connections and appropriate backflow protection, potential backflow hazards can range from a relatively low risk with no health implications to a high risk with serious health consequences. In the last three years, the following events have occurred in municipal water systems due to a cross-connection:

- 2009-In Idaho, an improperly installed Backflow Prevention Assembly (BPA) at a home resulted in untreated irrigation water contaminating a small portion of the water system with E. coli. The area affected included 120 homes. (source: KBOI News)
- 2009-In Utah, four cases of giardiasis were apparently caused by a cross-connection. County health officials said a resident making an illegal cross-connection of secondary water with the city's drinking water system is likely the cause behind four clustered



confirmed cases of giardiasis in the city. (source: Standard Net Live)

- 2009-In Kansas, over 24 people were sickened from a soda-machine carbonator backflow incident. Carbonated water was coming into contact with copper lines, causing copper-related illnesses when customers drank the soda. (source: KMBC-TV)

PROBLEM-Cross connections have been responsible for contaminating drinking water systems throughout the world. In order to effectively safeguard against such incidents, cross connection control is an on-going and continual requirement to ensure appropriate backflow preventers are installed. Water and piping systems are often being installed, altered, or extended introducing the potential for new cross connections.

SOLUTION-To safeguard against failure of backflow preventers from lack of maintenance and plumbing system changes over time, the City of Jerome's cross connection control program requires annual testing and reporting of backflow preventers by the owner of the plumbing water system.

A cross connection incident may not occur until the right circumstance (back siphonage or back pressure) occurs resulting in backflow of a chemical or a pathogen into the drinking water in a residence, business or separate water service from the municipal water distribution system. The appropriate backflow prevention device must be installed for the nature of the specific hazard on the premise. Those locations requiring testable backflow preventers must be tested and reported on a regular (annual) basis to ensure functionality.

PREVENTING AND AVOIDING WINTER FIRES

Emmitsburg, Md., November 10, 2011 – As we move closer to winter and home fire deaths begin to increase, the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) and the U.S. Fire Administration (USFA) remind everyone that fire safety and prevention are especially important in the coming months. Because home fires are

The NFPA and USFA recommend following these safety tips to prevent winter home fires:

- Stay in the kitchen when you are frying, grilling, or broiling food. If you leave the kitchen for even a short period, turn off the stove.
- Space heaters need space; keep

- Avoid using lighted candles. If you must use candles, place them in sturdy candleholders that won't burn.

- If you smoke, use only fire-safe cigarettes and smoke outside.

"Winter fires are preventable," Gaines emphasized. "Everyone should find out what they need to know to prevent a trag-



more prevalent in winter than in any other season, NFPA and USFA are once again jointly sponsoring a special initiative – Put a Freeze on Winter Fires – to help raise public awareness about winter fires.

"These fires are a painful reminder of what we see every year – the temperatures drop and fires increase," said NFPA President Jim Shannon. According to NFPA statistics, space heaters account for about one third of home heating fires and approximately 80 percent of the home heating fire deaths.

The USFA's Winter Residential Building Fires (PDF, 1 MB) report shows that each winter an estimated 108,400 residential building fires occur in the United States, resulting in 945 deaths, 3,825 injuries, and \$1.7 billion in property loss. Cooking is the leading cause of winter residential building fires at 36 percent followed by heating at 23 percent. Winter residential building fires occur mainly in the early evening hours, peaking from 5 p.m. to 8 p.m.

"The winter season brings the highest number of home fires, more than at any other time of year," said USFA's Deputy Fire Administrator Glenn Gaines. "Home fires increase in part due to cooking and heating. Winter storms can also interrupt electrical service and cause people to turn to alternative heating sources that contribute to the increased risk of fire during the winter months."

anything that can burn at least three feet away from each heater.

- Check electrical cords often and replace cracked or damaged electrical or extension cords. Do not try to repair them.
- Never use your oven or stovetop to heat your home. They are not designed for this purpose and can be a fire hazard. In addition, carbon monoxide (CO) gas might kill people and pets.
- Do not put your live Christmas tree up too early or leave it up for longer than two weeks. Keep the tree stand filled with water at all times.
